Stefano Pallanti is Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Florence in Italy and Chair of Education and Director of the Residency Program of Psychiatr since 2010. He is Visiting Professor at Imperial College London, Visiting Professor at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, and Adjunct Associate Professor at Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, where he served as the Founder and Director of the Center of Excellence for OCD, Impulsive and Behavioural Addiction.

He is a Executive Committee Member and the Scientific Board of ECNP (European College of Neuropsychopharmacology) and serves in its Educational Committee. He is the International Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and the International Advisory Board of the same for the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, for its Fourth Edition (DSM-IV) and the Obsessive Compulsive Disorder Spectrum Workgroup for the DSM-V. He is the Advisory Council of the International Center for Autism Research and Education (Icare4autism, New York), a member of the board of directors of the International College for Obsessive-Compulsive Syndromes (ICOCS) and an Associate Director of the European Certificate, International Master Course in Affective Neuroscience, Universities of Maastricht, Florence, Bristol and Tel Aviv. Since May 2013 he serves as a member of board of directors for Clinical TMS Society. Dr. Pallanti is a member of the New York Society of Psychiatry.

His current collaborative research projects are in the areas of treatment-resistant OCD, Behavioral Addiction, Anxiety in Psychosis, Anxiety Disorder and inflammation ADHD – OCD spectrum. He is particularly interested in rTMS and Neuromodulation treatments. He is an International Editor of *American Psychiatric Publishing Inc.*, a reviewer of many Scientific Journal Including JAMA, Biological Psychiatry and AJP. He is a board member of *CNS Spectrums*, and Editor of Archives of Behavioural Addiction where he is also a columnist.
